
A WELL EARNED RETIREMENT

PEER SUPPORT

At the start of each year at John Forrest Secondary College the Year 8 students undertake a peer orientation program. The program is called Peer Support and is aimed at helping Year 8s settle into high school by building vital relationships with older students. A group of Year 8s is paired with two or three Year 11s. Together they undertake five workshops which teach Year 8s ways to make new friends and build trust as a cohort. Below are two comments from students involved in this year's program.

“Over the past six weeks the Year 8s and Year 11s have participated in the Peer Support Program. We had two Year 11 buddies and a bunch of fellow Year 8s in each group. In week one we were given a booklet that was broken up into five sessions. Each session we would do group activities that got us to know, trust and learn



about each other. The activities were great because our Year 11 friends got us to interact and befriend people that we wouldn't usually talk to. By session five I felt that I really got along with my group and the group leaders, Matthew and Jesse. I feel that I got a lot out of the Peer Support Program and that it was a great experience.”

We all had a great time on camp, even though we all wished there was at least one more day to stay, but we had to get on our way to school and back home where our parents would be waiting to hear how everything went.



MPA Skills Pre-apprenticeship Programs

Twenty-five Year 11 and 12 students from six schools including John Forrest Secondary College have started their Pre-apprenticeship Certificate I training in the new John Forrest Trade Centre (JFTTC). The Plumbing and Gasfitting students have learnt how to lay pipes in a trench with a gradient fall, and have been working on assembling gasfittings.

The Painting and Decorating students have started work in the painting booths, learning to cut the painting into the edges of doors and architraves while practising their brush techniques.

Year 10 Try A Trade Programs

The Construction Training Fund sponsor Try A Trade Programs in the Building and Construction Industry at no cost to the

students unless transport is required to selected venues.

MPA Skills delivered the first Try A Trade Painting and Decorating two day program in the John Forrest Trade Centre on the 21/22 March to a group of keen Year 10 students.

Throughout the year there will be opportunities for students to nominate for more courses. A Plumbing and Gasfitting Program will be held on 10/11 May for boys. A girls group is also planned for the 21/22 August. A four day Bricklaying/Wall and Floor Tiling Program will be held in June and a three day Wall and Ceiling Fixing/Solid Plastering course from 21-24 June at Polytechnic West Balga Campus.

PARENT DONATIONS GIVE BOOST TO COLLEGE FACILITIES

CANTEEN FACES TOUGH CHANGES

Over the last few years, the college canteen has struggled to attract parent volunteers and as such, the P & C has needed to expend funds to employ the further workers required to operate the canteen. Recent drops in student numbers due to the half cohort moving in to secondary schools has also affected the canteen income. It has now become necessary to make the difficult decision of reducing canteen staff hours and hence the service provided by the canteen.

Commencing Term 2, the canteen will not be able to take orders for lunches before the commencement of the college day and some increases in prices will be seen in the new price list enclosed. The P & C will continue to monitor the situation and if these measures do not decrease the overall running costs of the canteen, further cuts in service may be unavoidable.

We are urgently seeking support from parents or grandparents who would be
